One must become an expert reader before one can hope to become an expert writer. To cultivate that expertise, a strong undergraduate program emphasizes a wide range of study in literature and other disciplines to provide students with the foundation they need to become resourceful—as readers, as intellectuals, and as writers. The goal of an undergraduate program is to teach students how to read closely as writers and to engage students in the practice of literary writing. An undergraduate course of study in creative writing gives students an overview of the precedents established by writers of many eras, continents, ethnicities, and sensibilities; it gives students the ability to analyze, appreciate, and integrate the components that comprise works of literature. By creating their own works, student writers may apply what they have learned about the elements of literature.

# B. SPRING 2019 PAUL WILLETO DEAN FOR SCHOOL OF ARTS, HUMANITIES & ENGLISH.

# C. 2019 MATTHEW JAKE SKEETS IS APPOINTED TO FURTHER DEVELOP THE CREATIVE WRITING PROGRAM.

- 1) Paul Willeto speeds up the process for establishing a creative writing program.
- 2) Matthew Jake Skeets and Paul Wiletto create checklist, curricula etc. for CW program.
- 3) Jake and Paul mold the CW program into an "emphasis" rather than a "full" CW program.
- 4) Prefixes for Creative Writing courses begin to appear sporadically for registration.

# D. FALL OF 2022 CREATIVE WRITING OFFICIALLY BECOMES A PROGRAM AT DINÉ COLLEGE.

1) Shaina Nez teaches the majority of the creative writing classes online.

2) Orlando White teaches one (fall 2021) and Jesse Maloney teaches a couple of CW course(s).

3) Most English/Creative Writing faculty are unaware where the CW program is going.

4) There is a continuation of differences philosophically about the CW program.

# E. SPRING 2024 ENGLISH/CREATIVE WRITING FACULTY "OFFICIALLY" BECOME PART OF THE CW PROGRAM.

1) Orlando White, Irvin Morris, and Haesong Kwon begin to teach CW classes.

2) Haesong Kwon, Irvin Morris, Shaina Nez, and Orlando White start CW BFA Assessment.

3) Haesong, Irvin, and Orlando are the core faculty for the Creative Writing Program.

4) Discussion among the faculty is ongoing on how to sustain and better the CW program.
